## St. IGNATIUS of LOYOLA: 31<sup>st</sup> July

The youngest of 13 children, Ignatius Loyola was born in Spain. When a young soldier he was badly wounded by a cannon ball that shattered his leg. As he recovered he asked for a best selling book of the day, a romance, to read to take his mind off the pain but ended up reading about Jesus and the lives of the saints. His life changed as he resolved to continue being a soldier, but now as a soldier for Christ.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and 6 others offered themselves to the service of the Catholic Church. They became the Society of Jesus and Ignatius was elected to serve as their first general. When other Jesuits were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius stayed in Rome founding homes for orphans and colleges all, in the words of the Jesuit motto, 'ad majorem Dei gloriam' - for the greater glory of God.

Dear All

The Rectory is situated at what I am told is called 'windy corner' in Forrabury, and I can absolutely understand why it is gained that name. It is a constant challenge to ensure that my pot plants are upright. However, as I am writing this in what has been declared the hottest June for 40 years, I am really missing any form of breeze or movement of air.

In the past few weeks we have been horrified by the dreadful incidents reported in our press. Atrocities perpetrated by terrorists whose twisted ideology leads them to explode bombs amongst children, mow down innocent pedestrians, attack people with knives, or drive from Wales to London in order to mow down people providing assistance to someone having a heart attack. One thing is clear – these terrorists do not represent the teachings of any religion. The God of Abraham – the God worshipped by Jews, Muslims and Christians - does not reward those who kill and maim the innocent, or those who attempt to strike fear into the hearts of people going about their everyday lives.

But terrorism cannot work if people refuse to be terrified. I recently saw a photograph that was taken in the Blitz in London during the Second World War. It showed a street reduced to rubble – but walking over the rubble was a milkman going about his normal work of delivering milk.

What these dreadful incidents, together with the Grenfell Tower fire, have shown us is the willingness of individuals to provide assistance to those in need. People offering transport, accommodation, water, food, and clothing to strangers. People of faith – from all faiths – as well as people with no faith, coming together, working together to meet the needs of those in crisis. Jesus told us that the two most important commandments were to love God and to love our neighbours as ourselves. And we have been witness to love of neighbour in action. We pray that those who are planning acts of terror will turn away from that path, and we give thanks for the humanity and care of each other that is the overwhelming human trait.

### Persecuted Christians in Kyrgyzstan

Kyrgyzstan is a small republic in central Asia. The population of 5.5 million is some 80% Muslim, 15% Christian (mostly Russian Orthodox) and 3% other Christian denominations. On the silk route, it was eventually occupied by Russia under the Tsars and then as a part of the former Soviet Union. On the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991 it achieved independence and has since been part of the trading union of former soviet countries in central Asia.

It is ruled by a semi-dictator President and an elected parliament. It is supposed to have freedom of religion, but in fact the New Religious Laws passed in 2009 have severely tightened government censorship and control by restricting the production, distribution and importing of religious literature, particularly Christian material. The law also restricts evangelism, forbids the involvement of children in religious groups, and introduced a clamp down on 'unregistered' religious activity, meetings or gatherings.

It also increased the difficulties to register a church with a cumbersome process and a minimum founding congregation of 200. On top of this, Christians who convert from Islam face enormous pressures to return to Islam, and discrimination (often involving violence, and ostracism) from their families and neighbours. In the face of all these problems many Christians have emigrated, reducing congregations and depriving churches of leadership.

### Prayers

**Give thanks to God** for the Christian Churches in Kyrgyzstan.

**Pray** for strength of faith and fortitude in the face of all the difficulties that beset them.

**Pray** for a relaxation of the rules and regulations being imposed on Christians there.

**Pray** that believers, especially Kyrgyz converts will know God's strength and peace.

**Pray** for ex-patriot Kyrgyz believers that they will remain true to their faith in their new countries.

**Ask the Lord to raise up effective leadership in the churches.**

## Boscastle WI Report

In May, members were entertained by speaker Ted Prior. On retirement Ted had decided to become a 'Beadle'. 'Beadles' were first formed in the twelve century as a police force. At that time they were drawn from men in the military, then later from clerks and today from ex-policemen or from members of civilian life. They carry out ceremonial duties and act as Master of Ceremonies at formal banquets also accompanying the Master of a Trade or Guild on civic occasions.

Ted explained his role as 'Gypsy Beadle' to the Livery Companies of the City of London requires him to move from one Hall to another, carrying out the various duties, whilst 'Hall Beadles' remain in one Hall only. The Livery Companies comprise London's ancient and modern Trade Associations and Guilds. These play a significant part in City life, providing amongst other things charitable-giving. Ted's role as 'Gypsy Beadle' took him to many functions and into many Trade and Guild Halls. The history of many Halls goes back several centuries. Merchant Taylor's Hall, for example, has the old walls of London incorporated into its structure whilst The Mansion House dates from 1739. The Mansion House is home to the Lord Mayor of London, during his term of office. As Ted remarked 'the most expensive council house in the country'.

May was also our 'Resolutions' meeting when we voted to support either 'Plastic Soup' - the effects of plastic fibres in the oceans - or 'Loneliness', a social problem which can affect all ages.

In June we will be 'Making a Teddy', guided by Celia Lloyd, and the 'Morning Coffee-ers' continue to visit cafés, monthly.

Looking ahead to July, we head for Forrabury Church on 11<sup>th</sup> July at 2 pm, where Jonathon Mann will introduce us to a 'Medley of Organ Music'. Non-members of the WI wishing to join us at Forrabury Church for this musical delight, will be most welcome.

Should you be interested in joining us at any of our meetings, we are a friendly group. We get together every second Tuesday of the month in the village hall at 2 pm, come along and get to know us. You may even have made friends with some of us already.
